### TO YOU, FROM PASTOR BARTLETT

We have been collecting our pledges and are getting in position to create the budget for the coming year. This financial information will be very helpful in determining how we will finance the continued outreach ministries for First Congregational Church, Marshfield.

I keep reading how many youth are taking their own lives and getting lured into drug abuse. The Gospel of Jesus Christ which we preach is the answer to destructive words and actions. The new life in Christ provides a purposeful mission to the world. This mission is not generationally oriented, but family oriented. The extension of the family is the church of God. Young people are the future of the church as older generations pass. The experience of the elders is invaluable in the training up of the next generations, but the focus of the church must be forward towards the generations that are coming. All Christians of all ages find their needs and visions fulfilled by caring for others in need, and that need now points to those who are coming of age. As has been demonstrated by our youth group and youth groups of the past in many churches, the youth have a tremendous ability to minister to the elderly and the shut ins, providing joy and love.

Sports on Sunday have not destroyed or demonstrably cut back our church ministries. It is, rather, our loss of vision and inability to deal with hardship that lies at the root of the problem. Sports for this lifetime cannot compete with a life plan that brings joy and success in this life and the life that is to come. Our challenge lies in determining how to bring all things together, in Christ, to bring about a transformation after God has answered our diligent prayer.

We have become accustomed to acting on information handed to us by our government and media without prayerfully considering the truth which comes from God. Our country was founded by those whose God provided the mandates. The great commission is the greatest mandate which we have. That mandate can only be fulfilled when our hearts are filled to overflowing with God's love for us and for all people everywhere.

As the interim and by contract, I am working with the church as an advisor to the Pastoral Search Committee. As a pastor, in search of a long term employment contract opportunity, I would be looking for the church commitment to growth which includes the elements mentioned above. I would also be looking for the financial and congregational personnel commitments to outreach. Therefore, as we go forward I would look to the search committee to develop a church profile that would emphasize the growth components.

I would also like the search committee to think about the question: "If I were a pastor, why would I want to pastor First Congregational Church, Marshfield." We have a list of duties to be performed by the pastor, but why would a pastor want to fulfill these duties? What makes our church a visionary place for career fulfillment for a pastor?

Another set of related questions concerns what we would expect of the settled pastor. A pastor can only do so much without active congregational leadership that already is open and moving in a direction of building the body of Christ in numbers and spirit. What kind of activities will move us as a congregation in the right direction? Calling? Outreach Bible studies? It is only after we have answered these questions, and initiated a workable and sustainable plan, that we should initiate a search for candidates to fill the position that has been created.

The season of Epiphany begins in January of 2022. A new year is a new time to look forward with hope for the future. Once the early church started, the growth was precipitated by the desire to share what God can do in a life. As part of this sharing, we will discuss spiritual gifts that are given to all Christians to employ in Christ's service and, hopefully, we will find opportunities for these gifts to be employed in new growth for First Congregational Church, Marshfield.

We had to do a repair on our Parish Hall furnace this month and replaced several of the thermostats to help us continue to conserve energy please reduce the thermostat setting as you leave.




Me, Myself, and Bob: A True Story About Dreams, God, and Talking Vegetables by Phil Vischer

Leaders and confirmands, Leah Murphy and Emma Verlicco, have acclimated well to the confirmation program, as they continue their study of Lee Strobel's book, "The Case for Christ." Learn along with us:

A recap of our last summary on the first two chapters:

Chapter 1, Lee explains how he as a journalist for the Chicago Tribune was a non-believer, and set out to prove that Jesus was a mere human and great teacher, but certainly not God. He runs his investigation to prove his premise as a lawyer would prepare for a trial; State vs. Jesus Christ.

Chapter 2, he looked at what people at the time thought about who Jesus was and who Jesus said he was. After myriad interviews with renowned biblical scholars/historians and research of ancient writings, he found that countless people, followers, and Jesus himself thought and said Jesus was God.

In Chapter 3, Strobel considered Jesus' sanity. This time he interviews respected psychologists about the clinical signs of mental Instability and found Jesus had none. One of those signs was claiming to be someone you were not. Such people believe they are a famous person, and God at the time was certainly famous and someone the Jews had been anticipating for centuries. Using Isaiah's prophecy of the Messiah and His coming, Strobel deemed that Jesus fit that description perfectly.

Examining the evidence of Jesus' being God, Strobel determined that thousands of people believed that totally after witnessing his miracles, his supreme understanding of the scriptures, and his superhuman awareness of things no one else could know. Lee pondered whether a crazy man could turn water into wine, cure the blind, raise the dead, or walk on water, to name a few. He also questioned why would the Jewish leaders of the time fear, be intimidated, or even care about a crazy person? Strobel even considered Jesus' being a hypnosis, learning they work via suggestion to cause people to believe things happened when they had not. Jesus made no suggestions to anyone; people just saw things He made happen. After scrutinizing hypnosis, he found no evidence.

In addition to all of this, one of the greatest pieces of evidence he found was that every Jew knew a claim to be God was blasphemy and punishable by death. Who would willingly die for a lie? Jesus had many chances to deny his deity and save himself, but did not. He gave his life for a truth.

Strobel concluded in chapter 3:

Jesus did not show any signs of mental illness.

Jesus was not a hypnotist.

Jesus fit the identity of the Messiah prophesized in the Old Testament.

Jesus willingly gave his life for the truth of His identity.

In January we will examine Chapter 4 to see whether Jesus matched the identity of the Messiah.

Our confirmands comprise a wonderful group of young women. Continue to keep them in your prayers. And when you see Emma or Leah, pass on a word of encouragement!



### SUNDAY SCHOOL: 1ST STOP: EXODUS

Starting in January, our Sunday School kids will be traveling into the Old Testament. First Stop is Exodus. Through their journey, kids will see how so long- ago, God claimed his people for himself and taught them lessons of truth, which still apply in their lives today.

Lesson 1: "Princess of Egypt" - Keep hoping in God, even when times are hard

Lesson 2: "The Reluctant Prince" - When God gives us a job, he'll give us the help

Lesson 3: "The Duel Begins" - God is bigger and more powerful than anyone

Lesson 4: "The God of Light and Life" - God takes care of us


Each Old Testament lesson pairs with New Testament scripture, as we do our best to "connect the dots." While connecting, we will have fun too!


